She added an upstairs office, and an entire wing off the master bedroom. One of the most crucial additions, and part of the reason her home looks so carefully curated, is the addition of closets. It's easy to acquire heaps of furniture, clothes or keepsakes over the years that we can't bear to part with, but how do you keep your space looking chic amid all the clutter? Storage and good organization are key.

But there was one storage area that had to go. When Sarah discovered that a closet was hiding a window with wonderful natural light behind its door, Sarah knew that she had to knock down the walls and redesign it as sunny window seat. She also uses this cozy reading nook to display a rare pop of pink, which she explains is her small act of feminine rebellion in a house full of men.

Sarah's bar wasn't always as stylish as it is now. When she bought the house, the bar area (which sits in the family room) seemed to be stuck in the 1970s. It was completely encased in mirrors, so Sarah took those out and opted for an off-white and slate-gray palette. She added brass accessories, a striking orbital light

The design is minimal and the alcove adds to the family room's décor instead of distracting from it. Sarah says, "I'm a simplistic person, so unless it has a lot of meaning, I'd rather not have the clutter."

A NEUTRAL BASE

Sarah's number one tip for keeping a home simple in its sophistication is to keep the larger pieces of furniture, like couches and armchairs, neutral. The one exception to this rule is her bedroom which has a romantic floral headboard. Usually, she brings patterns to the mix in smaller items, like throw pillows and vintage landscape paintings. With the flower patterns and pastoral art, the home has an undeniably fresh feel. Sarah's favorite color to decorate with is green, but you wouldn't immediately realize it. She finds subtle ways to incorporate it in her home, and almost all of her patterns have at least a hint of the color. The ferns in her home give it an earthy edge, but are all small and manicured so that they never distract from her chic style.

GLIMPSES OF GLAMOUR

While Sarah is all about keeping her home comfortable and functional, she doesn't shy away from glamour. Her upholstered chairs ensure her dining room is inviting, but the starburst mirror and gold lantern accent the formalness of the room. The vases and lamps are all white to keep the glimmering gold pieces the stars of the show.
